Week 3	Three-Letter Blends: scr, spl, spr, squ, str	- Two or more consecutive consonants in a word whose sounds blend together. 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Plurals (-es)	- When base word ends with s, z, x, sh, ch, a/zh/or /j/ sound spelling it is impossible to just add /s/ or /z/.
